

Ordinary Green

Duke Divinity School has a special window, made by a local NC glass artist, called the "Pentecost Window." In this window, the colors of the rainbow come together to signify the goodness of God in providing diversity within Creation and within the Body of Christ. Upon finishing one's degree program, each graduating class is given a thick glass cross made from the same colors that can be found in the Divinity School's Pentecost Window (red, orange-yellow, bright green, Duke Blue, light aqua, deep purple, and clear), and crosses are given during a special Cross Service at the end of the year. For example, one year, all the crosses will be blue, the next year they'll be green, the next red, etc. until the cycle repeats again. During the service, that year's batch of crosses is prayed-over, and the students worship and hear a sermon from a professor that they collectively chose to preach.

The class before me received blue crosses. When my friends and I were entering the chapel for our own cross service, we all wondered which color came next in the cycle.

Would we have clear? Would it be orange-yellow? I think we were all a bit dismayed that our color was green.

I don't mean to sound ungrateful; green is as basic as you get. We "ordinary." And we do! We decorate commemorate a period of time "ordinary time." 

Without "ordinary time," our lives might be too exciting, leading us to feel overwhelmed and exhausted. "Ordinary time" gives us the kind of breather that we need to settle down and prepare ourselves to get to work.

The concept of "ordinary time" also reminds me that our God is a God of not only our holidays, big emotions, or exciting times, but also of our everyday routine. I like to share with children that Jesus lived everyday lives just like us: He ate, slept, walked, played, and had a body that needed to burp or have other functions just like ours do. That means our God is the kind of God who lives with us in every season of our lives – not just the most exciting or trying times. Our God is God of all of it!

God takes the long road, camping out with us in our normal lives – and in all the aspects of our human condition. It means so much to me that God is here with me in the monotony, in the hardship, in the terrible, beautiful mess that is my life. And I would argue that this kind of God is the one you need too. We have a God of the ordinary times – and aren't we truly blessed by that?
